The Importance of Medicaid

MEDICAID PROVIDES HEALTH INSURANCE TO:



Ensuring coverage and financial security to rural Americans where residents are less likely to have health insurance through their job.

36.8 Million CHILDREN nationwide⁷

Giving kids what they need to stay healthy: check-ups, behavioral health care and more. Medicaid fills in the gaps left by private insurance for kids with chronic health conditions such as congenital heart defects and asthma.⁸

7.2 Million SENIORS⁹

Supporting low-income seniors (including those with Medicare coverage) with medical equipment, transportation to medical appointments and other services that can help seniors live comfortably in their homes.

156,000 NURSING HOME RESIDENTS¹⁰

Reducing out-of-pocket costs for seniors who rely on skilled nursing care and rehabilitation. Critical source of support to roughly 80 million people – 1 in 5 living in the US.

Backbone of health system financing for clinics, rural hospitals, behavioral health, long term care, childbirths.



Providing coverage to the 2 in 3 non-elderly Medicaid enrollees who work. Many low-wage jobs do not offer health insurance, leaving millions of working Americans without access to affordable health insurance. Medicaid enrollees that do not work most often have a disability, are caring for family members, or are attending school.

13.9 Million PEOPLE WITH MENTAL ILLNESS OR SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS¹²

Covering treatment and community services and supports, and offering critical funding to states and communities, to address our nation's behavioral health crisis.




Building on Social Security financial assistance, which does not cover health care costs, by providing essential services and support for people with disabilities to work, attend school and live in their communities. 875,000 VETERANS aged 19-64¹⁴

Giving access to affordable care for veterans with complex health needs, such as post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injury and chronic pain.¹⁵ While veterans can go to Veterans Health Administration facilities, they need insurance to pay for their care. Medicaid keeps low-income veterans from being uninsured. Largest source of federal funding to states.

Promotes economic stability – keeps people in school, working, out of medical debt.



What's Really Going on in DC?



State of Play (As of Today!)

Budget Reconciliation is a fast-track tool which allows Senate to pass legislation with simple majority – bypassing typical 60 vote threshold to overcome a filibuster.

House-Passed Bill

- House passed bill cut Medicaid by \$858.9 billion
 - Force states to change Medicaid financing structures
 - Freezes provider taxes at current level, restrict state-directed payments
 - Added bureaucratic burdens in enrollment paperwork
 - Work reporting requirements, reapplication every 6 months
 - Create cost-sharing for adults in expansion population
 - Reduce FMAP for states that use state dollars to cover immigrant family's health coverage

Senate Proposals

- Senate Finance Committee proposed even deeper cuts to Medicaid
 - Harsher cuts to provider taxes
 - Requires Medicaid expansion states to reduce from 6% to 3.5% over time
 - Work requirements apply to broader community
 - More expansive provisions banning access to Medicaid for families granted asylum, refugees, and other at-risk immigrant communities

Policy changes still ongoing



Goal to pass by July 4th

Senate looking to pass this week

- Majority Leader Thune's goal is to put final bill on the floor today or tomorrow which would tee up a final vote over the weekend
- Senate will stay in session until bill is passed

• House will have to pass Senate version

- Speaker Johnson also saying House will stay in session through 4th of July Recess if need be
- Many House members have issues with proposed Senate changes
 - State and Local Tax concerns
 - Medicaid and provider tax concerns



What Does This Mean For Oral Health?

Medicaid Adult Dental Benefits are not mandatory coverage and are at risk of being made less comprehensive or fully cut as states lose Medicaid funding

• Provider tax changes leave state budgets especially vulnerable

• Eligibility changes mean millions will lose coverage who are actually eligible for Medicaid – losing access to what could be their only affordable oral health coverage



Strategies to Defend Medicaid


- Educate Members of Congress and the public on the importance of Medicaid, put a human face on faceless budget numbers!
- ✓ Bring authentic voice and state/district level data to Washington DC
 - Localize the issue and the impact: what would cuts do to patients, rural communities, hospitals, state economies
 - Engage state, county, and local elected officials (governors, legislators, mayors) to put pressure on federal elected officials
- Engage the media: humanize the value of the Medicaid program
 - Storytelling campaigns (If you have a story you want to share contact stories@familiesusa.org)
 - Op-eds
 - Press conferences

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Advocacy and the Impact of Proposed Medicaid Cuts in Missouri

Missouri


6.25 million people live in Missouri.

1.3 million are eligible for Missouri Medicaid, also known as MO HealthNet.

Much of the state is rural.

Urban areas are St. Louis, Kansas City, Springfield and Columbia. St. Louis is the largest urban area.

Missouri has 8 contiguous states -Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Kentucky & Tennessee.



Missouri Medicaid (MO HealthNet)

- Comprehensive Dental Coverage is included for children, residents of nursing homes, people receiving the blind pension fund and pregnant women (covered for a full year post partum)
- The general adult population eligible for Missouri Medicaid has a limited benefit that includes preventive care but does not include dentures and crowns. There are other limitations.
- Missouri Medicaid includes both Fee For Service and Managed Care.

Missouri Is in a Unique Position

- Medicaid expansion established by petition referendum to amend the state constitution
- Having a constitutional amendment for Medicaid expansion makes it difficult to remove the expansion population from Missouri Medicaid (MO HealthNet)
- Expansion population is about 350,000 people

Difficult Math

- A set of phased-in tax cuts passed several years ago will likely result in a tight state budget starting in State Fiscal Year 2027 (July 1, 2026 June 30, 2027)
- SFY 2027 will be passed during the next legislative session (Jan. May 2026)
- Haug: End of multi-billion Missouri Financial surplus is near (Jefferson City News Tribune, 11June25) "The times are going to be getting tougher as we go forward, and so I think we would like to try to limit general revenue spending so that we are able to craft responsible budgets." Dan Haug, MO Budget Director, testimony to Senate Appropriations Committee, June 2025 special session
- Deep Cuts in the federal portion of Medicaid will require state funds
- Missouri does not have funding to make up the difference
- Missouri may need to make cuts that go beyond the Medicaid budget

Loss of Coverage

 Current estimate is that as many as 161,000 Missourians will loose Medicaid Eligibility under the current proposal – a little less than \$28 billion less in total Medicaid funds in 10 years – \$2.7 billion in 1 year.

(House Budget Bill Medicaid Proposals: State-by-State Estimates of Impacts on Expenditures and Enrollment, Authored by Manatt Health, Revised Analysis June 2, 2025, for FFY 2025-2034)

- These number could be worse with more strict redetermination requirements.
- Missouri has a track record of poor management of determinations/redeterminations, including many administrative losses of coverage.
- Work requirements will place a similar burden on Missouri that will create loss of coverage for many because of administrative issues.

Awareness and Advocacy

- Missouri health advocates have worked to ensure our congressional delegation is aware of potential impacts
- MO Medicaid cuts in 2005 provide a model for the far-reaching impacts of cuts <u>Missouri</u> knows from experience: Medicaid cuts will be felt throughout the economy
- We believe there is discussion between the Missouri administration and our congressional delegation

Outspoken Critique of Medicaid Cuts, to a Degree...

- "Republicans need to open their eyes: Our voters support social insurance programs. More than that, our voters depend on those programs." – Sen. Josh Hawley
- Hawley Op-Ed: Don't Cut Medicaid
- <u>Hawley warns GOP Medicaid cuts are 'morally wrong and politically suicidal'</u>
- <u>A surprising coalition of GOP senators holds all the megabill leverage</u>
- No one knows better than Josh Hawley that 'work requirements' are Medicaid cuts

Dental Impact

- 2016 Adult Dental Coverage
- 2022 Dental Rate Increase to 80% UCR (commercial)
- Increased dental provider enrollment
- Various Codes added
- Various Code rates increased

MO Medicaid Matters

Ongoing close working relationship with state Medicaid agency with good results

- **81,017 more Medicaid Participants** accessed Dental service in SFY 2024, compared to SFY 2022.
- **694 New to Medicaid dental providers** have enrolled since our work began in SFY 2022.
- In SFY2022, there were 36 counties that appeared to have no Medicaid Dental providers. In SFY2024 that number was reduced to 17 counties.


